Why an Auction?

The auction recognizes and supports the good work of ten vibrant service organizations in our community. It is meant to raise awareness of the organizations and generate modest support for their efforts. Note that <u>all</u> proceeds from the auction will go to the organizations being recognized; the VOICES chorus will not retain any proceeds.

Bidding Process

Bidding may be done before the concert and during intermission.

- Sign in and obtain a bidding number.
- Visit the baskets.
- Place bids on those you are interested in by entering your bid amount and bidding number.
- Minimum bids start at 40% of actual value of each basket.
- Bids must be \$5.00 or higher than the current highest bid.
- If you change or cross out a bid, place your initials by the change.

Winners

Winners will be announced immediately after the concert and will be the highest bidder for each item.

Payment

The items may be paid for after the concert by cash or check. Checks should be made out to I.C.C. If a winner is not able to pay today, the item will be held for you one week during which arrangements for payment and delivery are to be made. If an item is unclaimed after one week, the next highest bidder will be approached.

This Land Is Your Land

This Land is Your Land was written in 1940. When Woody Guthrie first got the idea for it, God Bless America was getting a lot of air play on the radio. His original manuscript used "God Blessed America for me" as the last line instead of "This land was made for you and me."

"This Land is Your Land," reflected not only Guthrie's support for the common folk, but also his deep love for his country. The verse celebrated the beauty and grandeur of America while the chorus drove home the populist sentiment that the nation belonged to all the people, not merely the rich and powerful.

The original lyrics to the song included this verse: There was a big high wall there that tried to stop me. The sign was painted, said "Private Property." But on the backside, it didn't say nothing. This land was made for you and me.

Love In Any Language

Love in Any Language was written and composed specifically for Sandi Patti by John Mays and Jon Mohr and its basic theme of the universality of love and its ability to transcend both the language barrier and the political differences between the various nations immediately appealed to her. Said Patti, "I've never really been an artist that says, 'Let's water this message down,' and this one seemed very universal to me. It was also nearing the time that the Gulf War was about to begin, and it felt powerful to sing a song that said love doesn't have any boundaries - love is just love, it doesn't matter where you live."

Clouds

Zach Sobiech was diagnosed with osteosarcoma in the fall of 2009, at the age of 14. The cancer started in his hip and had spread to his pelvis and lungs. When a scan in October 2010 showed about 20 new lesions in his lungs, Zach's mom suggested he start writing letters to say goodbye.

"I'm not good at writing letters," Zach said. "So I figured instead, I could just write songs for people, and they might be around longer. It's more powerful than writing a letter because a song can get stuck in your head. You find yourself humming it during the day."

Sobiech's family established **The Zach Sobiech Osteosarcoma Fund** at Children's Cancer Research Fund (http://www.childrenscancer.org/zach). In September 2015, Zach's fund reached \$1 million and continues to grow.

De Animals a-Comin'

A traditional Spiritual from 1936, *De Animals a-Comin'* retells the Biblical story of Noah and the ark. Contrary to the text of many Spirituals that sing of the struggles of African slaves as well as the promise of freedom in the afterlife, this song celebrates the story with the reiteration of the text, "Hallelu!"

I Will Survive

The song's lyrics describe the narrator's discovery of personal strength following an initially devastating breakup. It reached number one on the Billboard Hot 100 and on the UK Singles Chart on consecutive weeks. The song is also frequently recalled as a symbol of female strength and as a gay anthem. In 2016, the Library of Congress deemed Gloria Gaynor's original recording to be "culturally, historically, or artistically significant" and selected it for preservation in the National Recording Registry.

El Mambí

The word "Mambí" is attributed to Afro-Antillean origins and was first used to describe revolutionaries from Cuba and Santo Domingo (the Dominican Republic) in the 19th Century. Later it was the name given to the Cuban soldiers who fought against Spain in the Cuban War of Independence (1895-1898).

The words of this heartfelt song can be interpreted on many levels. Superficially, it is the story of a Mambí who goes off to fight for his country's independence. On the day of his departure, a female loved one, (whom we assume is his wife or lover but could very well be his mother), cries late into the night. The next morning she gets on her horse and follows his footprints through the jungle. The fighting grows fierce for the cause of liberty, and at some point he finds her mortally wounded, caught in the mayhem. Though he is tormented by her death, it ignites a flame that makes his love for her and his country grow exponentially. On a deeper level, this woman is a metaphor for Cuba--the Motherland (*la patria*). In Cuba's matriarchal culture, the mother represents the heart of a family.

Lyrics translation: (An) olive-skinned Cuban woman, I saw... The Mambí, the Mambí

Nostalgias de Serenatas

Santiago de Cuba is the second largest city in Cuba. Given Santiago's close proximity to Haiti and the Dominican Republic on the southeastern tip of Cuba, a distinct Afro-Caribbean spirit is seen in its architecture and heard in its music. It is an historically and politically significant city, the one chosen by Spain's greatest painter, Diego Velasquez, to be his second capital city. It is also the place from which Fidel Castro and Che Guevara launched their revolution.

Guido Lopez-Gavilan's arrangement of this piece artfully marries the text and music with rich harmonies that invoke the nostalgia that is present throughout the song in the opening and closing solo. The middle of the song changes mode as the speaker recalls memories of great love.

Lyrics translation: Nostalgic Serenades for the magical city of Santiago, Cuba

Intertwining itself in the night, the music is utterly magical; it envelopes the streets and awakens the balconies with nostalgic serenades.

It kisses the old walls with declarations of love, causing the large wooden windows to tremble and shake, windows where love was sown, where love was surrendered, where love still lives on.

Meanwhile, the moon smiles, illuminating the mountains, listening from the steeples to the city that sings.

Would You Harbor Me?

As artists, activists, and humanitarians, Sweet Honey In The Rock® has, for forty years, raised her voice to advocate for truth, justice and compassion while addressing the critical issues of democracy, freedom, racism, and economic and social justice.

Would You Harbor Me? holds up a mirror and asks us to examine our own beliefs, biases and convictions.

Bread and Fishes

Also known as *Wind in the Willows, Bread and Fishes* is a folk hymn. The melody is an 18th century Irish folk tune with lyrics by Alan Bell. It is based on a legend that Jesus travelled in England as a child, accompanied by his parents.

You Have Made a Difference

From the composer: My name is Brian Asselin and I am a recent graduate from the teacher's college program at the University of Ottawa. Towards the end of school, we the students, are reminded how fortunate we are to have principals, administration, and teachers who inspire students every day. While in teacher's college, I realized how fortunate I have been to have had such great teachers in my life that have helped shape the person I am today. I wanted to say thank you to all those who go beyond their daily job requirements, so I co-wrote this song with Eric Disero.

It Takes a Village

From the composer: In adapting the west African saying,"it takes a village to raise a child," I sought to embody the cultural concept behind this proverb—that it is truly all the individual parts linked and working together that create and support the whole. The four vocal rhythms in the main portion of the work, each with its own character and function, are essential to creating the unique energy and movement of *Village*. Only when they are sung together does a truly joyful spirit arrive.

Somos el Barco

Somos el Barco is an uplifting song of global unity. Over the years the verses evolved and still change as folks who speak languages like Russian and Gaelic make the song their own plea for all of us to "chart the waters never sailed before" and build a planet founded on peace and mutual respect.

Heal the World

In a 2001, Jackson said that "Heal the World" is the song he was most proud to have created. He also created the Heal the World Foundation, a charitable organization which was designed to improve the lives of children. The organization was also meant to teach children how to help others.
