

Program Notes

Kua Rongo Mai Koe words and music by Ngapo Wehi, arr. Eddie Quaid

Kua Rongo Mai Koe or the New Zealand Welcome Song is performed in Maori. Composer Ngapo Wehi is affiliated with the Pou Namu Museum in Auckland, New Zealand where his group, Te Waka Huaia, performs traditional Maori music.

We Shall Walk Through the Valley In Peace traditional spiritual, arr. Moses Hogan

The original author of this spiritual, which is at least partially inspired by Psalm 23, is unknown. It was included in *The Story of the Jubilee Singers; With Their Songs* by J.T.B. Marsh, which was first published in 1880. Arranger Moses George Hogan was an American composer and arranger of choral music. He was best known for his settings of African-American spirituals. His works are celebrated and performed by high school, college, church, community, and professional choirs today.

Yea though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil; for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me. (Psalm 23:4)

Make Them Hear You music by Stephen Flaherty, lyrics by Lynn Ahrens, arr. Jeff Funk

Make Them Hear You is a signature song from the Broadway show Ragtime. Based on the 1975 novel by E. L. Doctorow, Ragtime tells the story of three groups in the United States in the early 20th century: African Americans, upper-class suburbanites, and, Eastern European immigrants The protagonist, a successful African American piano player named Coalhouse Walker Jr., sets off a revolt after his wife is shot and killed by police for trying to shake hands with then President Teddy Roosevelt. At the end of the play, just before his last stand, he sings the song "Make Them Hear You," It has become a stirring anthem calling for justice for all and was performed on the steps of the Supreme Court as our nation's top justices debated marriage equality for same-sex couples.

Humble and Kind words and music by Lori McKenna, arr. Ed Lojeski

"Humble and Kind" is a song written by Lori McKenna and first released by American singer Tim McGraw in 2016. Among several other wins and nominations, the song won the award for Best Country Song at the 59th Annual Grammy Awards, "Video of the Year" at the 2016 CMT Music Awards, "Song of the Year" at 2016 CMA Awards and "Country Song of the Year" at 2016 American Music Awards. It has been certified platinum and reached the number one position on the country music charts in both Canada and the United States.

Ljubav transcribed and arranged by Mary Cay Brass

You may well recognize this tune as *The Cup Song* popularized as *When You Are Gone* in the movie Pitch Perfect. The original was written by the Carter Family in 1931 and has been adapted around the world. *Ljubav* is a Bosnian version remade by the children of a Sarajevo orphanage as a message of hope and peace for the children of the world. .

Bridge Over Troubled Water words and music by Paul Simon, arr. Kirby Shaw

Bridge Over Troubled Water was recorded for the fifth and final album of the duo Simon and Garfunkle. The song won five awards at the 13th Annual Grammy Awards in 1971, including Grammy Award for Record of the Year and Song of the Year. The song became Simon & Garfunkel's biggest hit single, and it is often considered their signature song eventually selling over six million copies worldwide, making it among the best-selling singles. It became one of the most performed songs of the twentieth century, with over 50 artists. It is a tribute to friendship and the importance of supporting those in need.

I Dream a World words by Langston Hughes, music by Rosephanye Powell

I Dream A World is a setting of the poem "To You" by Harlem Renaissance jazz poet, playwright and social activist Langston Hughes (1902-1967). In this song, the composer depicts musically Mr. Hughes's juxtaposition of the world that is and the world that could be. The world of which Langston Hughes dreams is characterized by joy, peace and freedom; yet, the one in which he lives is full of the "wretchedness" of racial prejudice and avarice. Commissioned in 2002 by Eddie Jones and the University of Arkansas Concert Choir, this work by Rosephanye Powell is an anthem for all those who believe in human rights, in peace and in hope for a better tomorrow.

If I Can Help Somebody words and music by Alma Bazel Androzzo, arr. Baruch Whitehead

If I Can Help Somebody is a southern gospel classic written by Alma Bazel Androzzo in 1945. It has been performed by many artists and choral groups perhaps most famously by Mahalia Jackson for whom it was a signature hit. It is said to be among Dr. Martin Luther King's favorite hymns. The version performed today was arranged by Ithaca College professor Baruch Whitehead, former artistic director of VOICES.

Sisi ni Moja words and music by Jacob Narverud

Jacob Narverud (b. 1986) is an American composer, arranger, and conductor. *Sisi ni Moja* is part in English and part in the South African language Swahili. Ever clever, composer Narverud came up with a highly rhythmic celebratory composition. The title translates "We are One", the theme being that all human beings have much in common.

Let There be Peace on Earth words and music by Sy Miller and Jill Jackson Miller arr. Craig Courtney

Let There Be Peace on Earth was written by Jill Jackson-Miller and Sy Miller in 1955. It was initially written for and sung by the International Children's Choir created by Easter Beakly and Arthur Granger of the Granger Dance Academy in Long Beach, California and the song continues to be the theme for this group of children who represent a host of nations. It has been covered by many artists and has become a standard for many congregations. It is a signature composition devoted to world peace and harmony among peoples.

- Let there be peace on earth and let it begin with me; Let there be peace on earth; the peace that was meant to be. With God our creator, children all are we. Let us walk with each other In perfect harmony.
- Let peace begin with me; Let this be the moment now. With every step I take let this be my solemn vow; To take each moment and live each moment in peace eternally. Let there be peace on earth, And let it begin with me.

Artistic Director

Lorrene Adams, Artistic Director for VOICES Multicultural Chorus, is a member of the music faculty at Lansing High School. In addition to teaching introductory and advanced placement music theory, she gives voice lessons, directs the school's Mixed Chorus, Varsity Chorale, and Show Choir, and is music director and conductor for the annual school musical. Prior to coming to Lansing, she held a similar position in Corning, New York.

As an advocate for the proliferation of high-quality choral music for high school students, Adams has commissioned and premiered choral works from composers Jonathan Santore, Rick Bartlett, and Peter Rothbart. She also performed the New York State premiere of Dominic Argento's *Walden Pond*. She founded the Ithaca Opera Chorus Ensemble, has directed numerous community and church choirs, and currently serves on the Ithaca College Unit Education Advisory Board.

A *summa cum laude* graduate of Ithaca College with an M.M. in conducting, Adams encourages collaboration between high school and community groups and believes that choral singing strengthens communities and enhances personal, mental, emotional, and physical health. She also strongly believes that we live in a world community; one of the best ways to learn about a culture, other than one's own, is through music. Music from other cultures plays a major role in the literature Adams selects for her choirs. VOICES Multicultural Chorus gives testimony to her beliefs and inspires her each time she steps in front of the group.

Associate Director

Ross Mizrahi holds Bachelor and Master of Arts degrees in music education from Ithaca College. With 14 years of directing and teaching experience, he currently is general music teacher for Belle Sherman elementary school in Ithaca. An accomplished singer in his own right, for three years he was singer and educational coordinator with "Sons of Pitches" performing in hundreds of venues all over the Northeast.


