The Songs

Behold Zion This rousing gospel song made popular by Shara McKee and the Pentecostals of Katy, Texas Sanctuary Choir is presented as arranged by former VOICES director, Dr. Baruch Whitehead.

Dai Lanu (This is enough) is a joyful celebration for any occasion. It was inspired by the traditional Passover song *Daiyenu* that lists the many gifts of God saying that if we had received only one of these gifts, it would have been enough.

Adinu is a traditional Sufi melody, the text of which is attributed to the Andalusian Moorish Sufi mystic, philosopher, poet, and sage, Abū 'Abdillāh Muhammad ibn 'Alī ibn 'Arabī. He is regarded as one of the most influential figures in world spirituality. *Subhanaka*, included as a solo, is a prayer for forgiveness in the Islamic ibtihal tradition. Interspersed with *Adinu* are phrases from the traditional Christian hymn "For the Beauty of the Earth" by Folliott S. Pierpont.

Omnia Sol (Let Your Heart be Staid) Quoting composer Stroope, *Omnia Sol* "is a reflection on the constant passage of events and people in life's continuum, and the human need to anchor words of love and commitment in the hearts of those who have been pillars along life's way." The text is a mixture of English and Latin found in the poetry of Carmina Burana:

Omnia sol temperat, absens in remota. (The sun warms everything, even when I am far away.) *Ama me fideliter, fidem meam noto.* (Love me faithfully, and know that I am faithful.)

Gabi, Gabi is based on a South African praise song in the Zulu language. *Gabi, Gabi* was among the songs of praise and freedom prohibited during the apartheid regime in South Africa.

Praise the Father (Mother), Liberating Lord! He (She) frees all the captives and gives the hungry bread. *Ljubav* You may well recognize this tune as *The Cup Song* popularized as *When You Are Gone* in the movie Pitch Perfect. The original was written by the Carter Family in 1931 and has been adapted around the world. *Ljubav* is a Bosnian version remade by the children of a Sarajevo orphanage as a message of hope and peace for the children of the world.

We Are... is from "Lessons" an a capella suite of songs by Ysaye M. Barnwell published in 1993. Barnwell is most known for singing with and musical compositions performed by Sweet Honey In the Rock. Her songs are rooted in African American singing traditions but carry powerful contemporary messages.

We are our grandmothers' prayers, our grandfathers' dreamings, and the breath of our ancestors. We are filled with imagination and hope, big dreams and endless possibilities. We are different, yet we are all the same. We are one.

We Can Be Kind was written by David Friedman, a film and theater composer, songwriter, author lyricist, and conductor and was the inspiration for Friedman's popular book of the same title. The song offers a powerful reminder of how we need to treat each other, from children to family to coworkers as well as strangers, neighbors and those across the political aisle.

Give Me Your Tired, Your Poor is from the 1949 Irving Berlin Broadway musical "Miss Liberty" with lyrics from the Emma Lazarus sonnet "The New Colossus." While "Miss Liberty" had a disappointing run, "Give Me Your Tired, Your Poor" became a classic in patriotic repertoire and a staple among traditional choral arrangements.

Three Little Birds is in the Reggae musical style which originated in Jamaica in the 1960's featuring syncopated rhythms and simple harmonies. Bob Marley, the most well-known writer and performer of reggae music, wrote and recorded "Three Little Birds" in 1977.
